Green Clubs, Cutting the Tennis Ball, by Don Lewis

My least favorite part of making Green Clubs is cutting old tennis balls in half. Serendipity recently made that a bit easier.

During the holidays I found myself needing to cut a small mountain of baguettes (french bread) into slices. My old bread knife just wasn't going to be up to the task. I visited the local commercial kitchen supply store, fully expecting to have to spend a ridiculous price for a really good knife to get the job done. Well they certainly had lots of expensive knives, but they also had some wickedly serrated utility knives made by Johnson-Rose that were both solid and well under \$10 that made short work of my stack of baguettes.

The next time I had to slice some tennis balls to make clubs, I tried my new knife out and it was much easier than an Xacto or a utility knife. The ball hardly had a chance to fight back. So my new favorite tool for slicing tennis balls is a 13 inch serrated bread knife.

A sharp knife makes the job easier and safer, but remember to keep your fingers out of the way. Don't push hard on the knife, let it do the work. The harder you push on the blade, the more chance it has to bounce off the ball and shorten your fingers. Be Careful!

Youth Jugglership Program 2009



As the IJA faces a growing financial problem, I'm surprised no one has thought of the current popular answer: a government bailout.

In the U.S., Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac are considered TBTF (Too Big to Fail). So let's convince the federal government that the IJA is TVTNMTF (Too Vital to National Morale to Fail). We send a delegation to Washington (not on our private jets, please) and make our pitch. We need to convince lawmakers that a world without a strong juggling organization is a world no one wants. It would be a world without whimsy, a world without play. A selling point is that if the IJA fails, it would be a blow to the variety industry. If jugglers can't make it, can ventriloquists and quick-change artists be far behind?

Sure, we'll say, the economy stinks. But we're all in this together. Every variety art is like a passer in a multi-person feed; we all must function effectively in order for the pattern to exist. No doubt the lawmakers will try to shift the blame to us. Could we have managed ourselves better? How come the Japanese are so efficient, excelling in Eastern and Western forms of juggling? We may have to make some concessions, such as to hold down costs. They may ask if we're willing to work for \$1 a year. We reply that we weren't looking for that big of a raise.

In the end, though, we make our point. The nation needs us. America will prosper only by investing in juggling technology of the future. The feds funnel trillions of dollars our way, on the condition that we not spend it all on poi.

Where are we going? by Chuck Hawley

At our December board meeting, it was made clear by bookkeeper Holly Greeley that the IJA financial footing is slipping. If current trends continue, we as an organization will have some very tough, drastic decisions to make by the end of this year. The fact is that membership, festival attendance, and income are all on the decline. In addition we have lost our video inventory due to our necessary compliance with music copyright laws.

The festival site selection committee is looking for direction from the board. There is concern that if we sign a contract too far in advance that we will not be able to fulfill it. At the same time if we wait too long we may not be able to lock in good pricing. The board is looking for input from the membership. What aspects of the festival are absolutely necessary to keep? What should be cut out? Where can we save money while not compromising attendance?

I think we need to re-evaluate our current volunteer model. Since we have converted to this business model we have had a decrease in the number of volunteers and an increase in the amount of work by each of the volunteers. I fear that soon we will not have any fresh volunteers to fill the positions

of those volunteers who leave their positions. Once again the board would like to hear from the membership - what would you like the organization to do. Increase the number of paid staff? If so how do we afford it? How should we attract more volunteers? How do spread the workload?

Our magazine contact ends in December 2009. Anthony Shave is addressing this and you will be hearing more from him in the near future.

I am writing this in a hope to start the conversation about where to go. I am not as pessimistic as others about the future of the organization. I think we have a lot to offer as an organization. We just need to find the right way to do it.

Basic Club Tricks - continued, by Don Lewis The Flourish.

This is a trick where the club never leaves your hand. It rotates around and through your fingers. There are several styles of flourish, but we're going to do one that is fairly easy to learn. In the workshop, I explain the movement and demonstrate, and see a lot of confused expressions. The mind wants to make this a lot more complicated than it really is, probably because the starting position is unusual.

Hold your hand out in front of you, palm down. Just to be perfectly clear, your palm is horizontal to the floor. If there was a table top in front of you, you could slap it.

Place a club vertically between your thumb and the rest of your hand, with the handle pointing up, and the body below your hand. We're working with the club's balance point, so most of the handle should be sticking up above your hand.

Using the fingertips of your other hand, reach under the club and move the tip of the club body towards you, just inside the forearm. Keep going until the club has made a half circle. Turn your hand over as you go so that it is palm up, but don't change your grip on the club. The body of the club is now above your hand, and the handle is below it. That's the inside circle. Now that you know what it feels like, you don't need the other hand any more.

Next, let the body of the club fall forward between the first two fingers of your hand and turn your hand over again. This time the club rotates outside your arm. You wind up with the handle in your palm, still gripped between those two fingers. If you just move your forefinger to the other side of the handle, you're back in a totally normal grip. Or, you can move your thumb to the other side of the handle, allow the club to rotate, and you're back in the staring position.

Try that a whole lot of times, until the movement is continuous. The movement is inside circle to palm up, and outside circle to palm down. The initial act of turning your hand palm up swings the club towards you and gives the club its starting momentum. By moving your thumb out of the way at the end of the trick, you can flourish continuously.

Now you need to learn how to get into the starting position when juggling. It's simple. You catch the club high and early in its flight. Still with one club, throw a regular cascade throw to the other hand. Make sure it peaks at least at shoulder level, since if you are going to catch high and early, the club has to at least get up there. Stick your hand out, palm down, and catch the club in the crook of your thumb. You catch it earlier than normal, so the club hasn't rotated to its regular position. And that is just where you want it. It feels a bit strange, but just stick your hand out there about shoulder level, and you'll find a club in it with the handle sticking upwards.

Practice grabbing that club out of the air, and going directly into the flourish movement in one fluid motion. Practice both sides until it feels quite comfortable.

The flourish takes a bit of time, so including it in the three club cascade means that you need to add some free time to your pattern. The way to do that is to combine two tricks. The double height throw introduces a wait in your pattern, so a flourish is a good thing to do while you're waiting.

Juggle a cascade, and initiate a flourish with a high, early, thumb catch. Your next throw from the other hand is a nice lofty double. The double can be either a crossing throw to the hand that is doing the flourish, or a column throw to the same hand. Finish the flourish and throw it, catch the double, and resume your cascade. Work on flourishes from either side. Once you're adept on each side, try flourishing on both sides using a triple to gain the time you'll need.

The most common problem adding this trick to the cascade is freezing. You catch the club in the right position to start the trick, throw the double from the other hand, and notice that your hand hasn't even started the flourish. It's practically glued in space while everything else is hitting the floor. Part of it is that your hand simply isn't used to catching in that position. Another part is that you have to throw a double, a different trick, with the other hand. Your inner sceptic is convinced there'll never be enough time to put everything together. If this happens to you, make your hand do the flourish and then pick up the rest of the clubs. Try again. Once your hand gets the idea that you're going to make it do the flourish regardless of what else happens, the trick will smooth out. Also, make sure that double is going high enough to give you enough time to finish the flourish.

This is still a cascade pattern, so you do have to keep your arm moving. Don't just reach out, catch the club, stop and do the flourish, and then start juggling again. It helps if you catch the club with a slight upward motion while you begin the flourish. As you finish the movement, bring your arm down and into a regular cascade throw.

This is a flashy, impressive trick that is well worth a bit of practice to add to your repertoire.

The Birdhouse Factory, by Don Lewis

According to the printed programme, if you mix Circus, Machinery, Theatre, and Dance, you have a perfect description of the Birdhouse Factory. I saw the show at La Tohu, in Montreal where it played to enthusiastic audiences.

The jugging interest in the show is provided by Pat McGuire. In the first part he presents a very businesslike routine of large balls. In the second half he juggles birdhouses that very much resemble cigar boxes.

At the end of the show, I sat there for a few minutes and the thought that came to me was that Art Jennings would have loved this show. Art loved tinkering with machinery and building things. He would cheerfully rant on to anyone who would listen that a good show had to tell a story, and have engaging characters, not just a succession of acts.

Imagine a circular platform, then perch it on unicycles at each of the cardinal points. Two acrobats can pedal this hugely maneuverable contraption all over the stage with apparent ease. Place a contortionist on the center of the platform, and she can be wheeled all over the stage so that everyone gets an up close view.

All the props in the show turned out to be parts of the factory setting, some obvious and other less so.

I won't ruin the story by telling you the whole thing. If the show comes to your town, go see it.
